NISKAYUNA BRANCH

The heavy use of the new Niskayuna Branch Library continues unabated. The staff and volunteers are barcoding and inventorying library materials as fast as possible in order to accelerate the automation of circulation at the branch library. The present manual system is overloaded and cannot cope effectively with the high circulation.

On Sunday, July 23, volunteers and staff under the leadership of Wonja Brucker and Jill Bendick planted 21 flowering crabapple trees on grounds of the new Niskayuna branch library and town hall. The trees were donated by Frank Popolizio in memory of the children killed in the Oklahoma bombing tragedy. Other trees were donated by the town tree council and by the Gilbert Harlow Garden Club and the Rosendale Garden Club of Niskayuna.

FACILITIES IMPROVE

Consideral improvements have been made to library facilities this summer. Work has begun on restoring the facade at the Duane Branch. New spaces designed in handicapped parking accordance with ADA standards have been painted in designated areas of the central library and the Glenville branch library parking lots. ADAapproved door closures have been installed at the Mont Pleasant, Rotterdam, and Quaker Street branch libraries. At the Scotia, Duane, and Woodlawn branches, the handles on doors into the main entrances and bathrooms have been replaced by ADA-approved hardware. At the central library, sliding glass doors have been installed at the Liberty Street entrance.

An FM-based assistive listening device for the hearing-impaired has been incorporated into the sound system of the McChesney Room. FM receivers are now available to those requesting them.

PAT WHITNEY HONORED AS VOLUNTEER FOR FRIENDS

Last spring, Pat Whitney was recognized at the Annual Meeting of the Council on Community Services for her volunteer efforts on behalf of the Friends of SCPL. She was also honored at the annual dinner of the Friends, in May. As organizer of the Friends' Book Sales, she recruits and coordinates the work of over 100 volunteers for each sale; during her tenure over \$100,000 has been raised from these sales. The proceeds have gone to purchase books for the branch libraries. Pat also serves as membership chairman for the Friends and is the liaison with the GE Foundation for their "More Gifts-More Givers" Matching Grant Program. We are all indebted to Pat and to Roger, her husband, for their dedicated service to the Friends, the library, and the community.

CHECK OUT THIS CHECKOUT!

It's hard to miss the new equipment near the checkout desk of the Central Library. Similar to a bank ATM, the new automatic self-service checkout machine should prove a valuable addition for patrons. Readers who do not have overdue materials can charge out books on their own. Presently they cannot charge out audiovisual materials, though that may come later.

FROM THE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Ron Lagasse, Director of the Library, reported that on Saturday, August 26, the Government Center Task Force of Schenectady 2000 organized a landscape workday at the Central Library. Reference librarian Toni Rader led a large group of volunteers in extensive weeding, tree-trimming, and plantings of perennials. A very attractive Japanese garden, the gift of Dr. Giknis, has been established on town property adjacent to the branch library. Mr. Wusterbarth reported that window seats will soon be constructed in the bay windows in the new Niskayuna library, a gift of Mr. and Mrs. Simon Weinstein.

On Saturday and Sunday, September 9-10, the library and other county agencies set up displays at the Schenectady County Airport in conjunction with the Flight 95 air show. The library's display focused on books featuring the construction of paper airplanes. Visitors were able to construct a paper airplane, a very popular activity for the many children who stopped at the library booth.

County personnel recently installed vinyl siding on the front of the Duane Branch Library. The section beneath the windows has been covered with highimpact tile, which creates a very attractive facade. A new sign will be added to the front of the library.

The Summer Reading Program was very successful at the central library and branches, which saw a registration of 1,011 children, and a total attendance of over 3,900 children.

The Niskayuna Branch is now automated. The process was accomplished in slightly over two months. Automation was a priority because staff found it difficult to handle the increased volume of circulation by traditional manual procedures.

At the December meeting of the Board of Trustees, Mr. Lagasse reported that overall circulation had increased by 2.83% as compared with the same period in 1994. Circulation at the new branch library in Niskayuna increased by over 69%.

Esther Swanker announced that she and Marjorie Woods attended the recent YWCA Women of Achievement Awards dinner, at which Melinda Myers was recognized for her numerous contributions to our community.

MYSTERIES, PUZZLES, AND CODES

Jo Adams, of Young Adult Services, has reported the great success of the Summer Action Series: *Mysteries, Puzzles, and Secret Codes*, held every Thursday last August. Ninety-two young people attended some or all of the programs. Cooperation from the Boy Scouts of America, the American Cryptogram Association, and the U.S. Navy helped to enliven the reading-enrichment series. Friends of SCPL funded the programs.

Booklists were distributed at the beginning of the series. One of the bibliographies, For Your Eyes Only, was encrypted by volunteer Victoria Schiavone, in a code from the Codemaster columns of Boys Life Magazine, which gave permission to copy and distribute it. The Scouts also donated a short video about the history of secret codes.

Charlotte Rounds, a teacher from Slingerlands and a member of the American Cryptogram Association, presented code-writing games. The largest audience watched the Navajo Codebreakers video from the library's collection. Members of the audience included teens from the Schenectady Respite Program. The series concluded with a demonstration of naval semaphor.

Each participant experienced an average 20-45 hours of extra reading for pleasure.


