Since 1986 HMLA has recognized contributions of individuals and organizations for excellence in the world of professional librarianship.


## **NEWSLETTER WORKERS**

Bob Orr was active on the board of directors of the Friends and coordinated many excellent programs in the "Table Talks" and "Books Sandwiched-In" series.

Bob had a lot of interests besides his medical profession. He obtained an M.A. in English from SUNY-Albany and was a long-time member of local writers' clubs. He was a master gardner and apiarist, an active cross-country skier and bicyclist; he took up roller-blading at an age when most of us slow down.

Mainly, Bob Orr was a wonderfully kind person, and he will be missed greatly.

## NEW COMPUTER CATALOG COMING

During 1997, the library will be converting from a CD-ROM computer catalog to an online system. The new system will use the Information Gateway interface, which is completely different from the CD-ROM version. To lessen the shock of the unfamiliar and ease the public into the new menu system, the library plans to schedule staff and volunteers in 2- or 3-hour shifts right at the terminals, to assist and instruct.

To those who have been dialing-in from home, the Information Gateway system will already be familiar. For those who haven't, the staff will be providing instruction.

Friends of the Library can be very helpful volunteers in assisting with this orientation of the public. It is a perfect opportunity to learn a new skill and work with the public.

E. Timothy McGowan, Head of Reference and Adult Services, says, "The migration to a public on-line catalog is the biggest development at the Library in almost thirty years." Friends of the Library, and other citizens, can facilitate the introduction of library users to the "information superhighway." ## PROPOSED REVISIONS OF BY-LAWS

The Board of Directors is proposing revisions to the by-laws to facilitate financial reporting. The Board recommends these changes, which will be presented to the membership for a vote at the annual meeting on April 15. Please be present, ready to vote on the changes, which are underlined below.

Article III, Sec. 4:

[The fiscal year shall run from July 1 to June

The fiscal year shall run from January 1 to December 31.

Article III, Sec. 5:

[Contributions shall be payable annually at the beginning of the fiscal year.]

Contributions shall be payable annually in the Spring after the annual meeting.

Article VIII, Sec. 4:

The terms of the officers shall run concurrently with the fiscal year of the organization.]

The terms of the officers shall run from annual meeting to annual meeting.

Rationale: As for Article III: presently, the Treasurer must prepare annual reports twice a year (1) on a calendar year for the I.R.S., etc., and (2) on a July-to-July year for other workings of the organization. This change would mean that the Treasurer's report at the annual meeting will also be for the calendar year preceding the meeting. As for Article VIII: it is intended that the Friends' membership year will run from annual meeting to annual meeting, so that membership renewals will be mailed at about the same time as they have been in the past.




