LIBRARY IMPROVEMENTS

A new roof has been installed on the central library building. Energy efficiency will be improved because a very substantial layer of insulation was also applied. A new rug will be installed in September. It will replace the worn out rug that dates back to the construction of the central library in 1969. The well-worn rug at the Woodlawn Branch was recently replaced and has added greatly to the attractiveness of that building.

Circulation of books and other materials for the first six months of this year has increased systemwide by 8.4% when compared with the same period last year. The increase amounts to 38,037 items.



The Friends annual meeting was held in the McChesney Room on Tuesday, April 8. Kevin DeFebbo, Schenectady County Manager, was our speaker. Mr. DeFebbo spoke of the importance of libraries in his life and his determination to continue the excellence of SCPL. Gershon's Catering served a delicious dinner. Alice Lee treated the audience to three delightful piano selections. Simon Weinstein reported on a variety of successful activities, including book sales that brought in more than \$35,000 to be spent for new books and materials, and a profitable first year for the Whitney Book Corner. Award certificates were presented to Virginia Murphy, Katherine and Charles Swartz, and Junice Wusterbarth, who have worked on more than twenty book sales. A slate of new and continuing officers and directors, proposed by the nominating committee, were elected. Andy Kulmatiski, Library Director, reported that total circulation at the ten library locations is expected to reach 1,000,000 items this year. Of the county's 146,000 residents, 78,000 have library cards. Andy's words, "Any resident can visit the library and access the best our culture has to offer". During the year, some of the facility improvements recommended in the Master Plan have been completed. include the new carpets, new work areas, and completion of the energy-efficient lighting that will save \$30,000 per year in energy costs.
