## <u>September 10</u>-- *Team of Rivals: The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln*, by Doris Kearns Goodwin Reviewed by Robert Coan, local attorney; UCALL Steering Committee

Esteemed historian Doris Kearns Goodwin offers fresh insights into Lincoln's leadership style and his deep understanding of human behavior and motivation.

#### September 17-- The River of Doubt: Theodore Roosevelt's Darkest Journey, by Candice Millard

A year after Roosevelt lost a third-party bid for the White House in 1912; he accepted an invitation for a South American trip that quickly evolved into an ill-prepared journey down an unexplored tributary of the Amazon known as the River of Doubt. #### 2008 ONE COUNTY ONE BOOK NARROWS CHOICES TO FIVE BOOKS

Five books, including three works of fiction and two works of non-fiction, were announced as the 2008 finalists for Schenectady County's popular One County One Book (OCOB) program. For the first time in the program's three-year history, non-fiction books placed in the final five.

The books are: *Before You Know Kindness*, a family saga about the aftermath of a gun fire accident; by Chris Bohjalian; *Hiroshima*, John Hershey's collection of first person accounts after the atomic bomb was dropped; *The Kite Runner*, Khaled Hosseini's epic tale of fathers and sons in Afghanistan that takes the reader from the final days of the monarchy to the atrocities of the present; *Nickel and Dimed: On (Not) Getting by in America*, Barbara Ehrenreich, this premier reporter of the underside of Capitalism gives a first hand account of surviving at the poverty level; and *Water for Elephants* by Sara Gruen, a compelling and gritty story set amid life in a traveling circus during the Great Depression.

The community nominated a total of 130 books to be considered by a community-based selection committee who followed established criteria including that the books lend themselves well to programs and discussion and are available in audio-book, large-print and paperback editions.

The public is encouraged to review the final five books and cast their vote. Ballots are available at all Schenectady County Public Library locations, the Open Door Bookstore, The Whitney Book Corner, and on line at <a href="https://www.scpl.org">www.scpl.org</a>. Further information is available at <a href="https://www.scpl.org">www.scpl.org</a>. Ballots must be cast by October 12, 2007.



Even the remaining books get a second chance, as the company we sell them to attempts to market them on line, before they are recycled.



Torn by decades of war and oppression, the women of Kabul embrace perm rods and mascara with unbridled hope even as they candidly recall the horrors of burkas and bombs. Both humorous and slyly subversive, the film offers poignant moments of culture clash between the Americans and Afghans and touching moments of feminine solidarity.

## LIBRARY TO CLOSE FOR 18 MONTHS

On Tuesday, April 29, the Board of Directors of the Friends met with some invited past directors and members of the Library staff to discuss the decision by the County Legislature and the Board of Trustees to close our downtown library. After an hour's heated discussion we developed a consensus that we would issue this special newsletter to the membership. The second hour was spent dealing with the programs of the Friends and the Library and how to assure that they will be continued successfully.

Two days after our meeting the Gazette carried an article that made public the proposed closing. These comments were attributed to Esther Swanker but originated with the County:

- "The project would take a year longer if the library were kept open . . . ."
- "It would also cost an additional \$1 million to \$1.5 million on top of the original \$7.76 million budget . . . ."
- "... [I]t would be too expensive to move some library resources to a temporary location that could be used by library patrons during the project."

It was also alleged that closure is for the safety of the 1400 daily patrons.

Many in the meeting challenged these statements. "If the Niskayuna High School can continue operation during extensive construction, why not us?" was a typical comment. "Why not close for very brief periods – when adding the new HVAC, switching power, etc." "What is the actual "phasing" timetable?" For some of these questions we may have to wait until the contractors respond with their schedules. Bid requests went out on Monday 4/28 and are to be returned and opened on May 16, 2008.

As we currently understand the County's plan, it calls for the following: The first floor will be closed to patrons, but the collection will be accessed by the staff to fill requests for books to be sent to a branch library for pickup. The second floor will be open to staff and the Friends so sorting of books for the sales and Whitney Book Corner will continue. Provisions also will continue for book donations.

A majority at our meeting agreed that the county was acting against the needs and wishes of the community and should revise their plans to avoid the proposed shutdown. The majority of those present also spoke for a suspension of the construction planning until an interim operating plan for the Central Library is in place. The sentiment was that keeping the building partially open for the duration would be desirable and feasible.

Friends should continue to follow the Gazette for news articles and Letters to the Editor about the library. One letter and one Gazette editorial were printed on Sunday, May 4. At the Book Sale on May 3&4 we asked our customers to state their opinion: (1) continue with closure or (2) change the plan so closure is not necessary or minimized. The vast majority said to keep open, and written comments stressed that opinion. We will continue to contact the public to seek their opinion while we await the County's reaction to this outpouring of support for our library and the opening of bids due on May 16. Keep your eye on the newspapers, attend any public meetings that might concern the library, express your opinion, and stay informed.
